










Overview of 2023 Town Twinning Call results

Town Twinning CALL 2023 - OVERVIEW

- Available budget 4,000,000 €
- 372 submitted proposals
- All proposals assessed by external experts
- 115 under signature (10 in reserve list)
- General Success rate 25%
- Average euros 34.750 +/-
- Thematic areas: cultural heritage, EU identity, solidarity and climate change. An increase in projects related to youth has also been observed.

Town Twinning CALL 2024 – Submission data

- Call Publication: 22 January 2024
- Call opening: 09 April 2024
- Call deadline: Check the F&TP
- Evaluation period: Sept 2024 March 2025
- Information on evaluation results: March 2025
- GA Signature: by mid-June 2025
- Available Budget EUR 4 000 000



Eligibility - Applicants

- Legal entities (public or private bodies) from eligible countries
- Eligible countries (EU MS eligibility subject to signed association agreements) - <u>list-3rd-country-participation_cerv_en.pdf (europa.eu)</u>
- Public bodies or non-profit organisations: eligible if representing local authorities (a letter of support signed by a Municipality)
- Submitted by a single applicant, which should be registered in the Participant Register (PIC)

Eligibility - Other conditions

- Municipalities or other level of local authorities of at least two eligible countries (coordinator + at least 1 associated partner)
- Number of participants: minimum of 50 participants in the Town-Twinning events, of which 25 are invited international participants
- Geographical location: activities in eligible countries
- Duration: from 6 to to 12 months
- Projects must comply with ethics and EU values



Important to keep in mind before apply for a Town Twinning

- **Gender** equality to be mainstreamed (ad hoc slides will be presented)
- If an activity that you want to organise will involve **children**, and you are not a municipality, a **declaration** on the respect of the child protection requirements must be provided in the proposal

What is a successful proposal?

- Impactful: concrete targets and results
- Realistic objectives
- Responsive/engaged coordinator
- Originality (a new angle)
- Innovation (building from past projects)
- A variety of countries (min 2 while more is desired for a more positive assessment)
- Build on existing goodpractice : concrete multiplier effect (partner search via formerly supported projects)

Award criteria and evaluation process

Award criteria	Minimum pass score	Maximum score
Relevance	25	40
Quality — Project design and implementation	n/a	40
Impact	n/a	20
Overall (pass) scores	70	100

Maximum points: 100 points

Individual threshold for the criterion 'Relevance': 25/40 points.

Overall threshold: 70 points.

Proposals that pass the individual threshold for the criterion 'Relevance' AND the overall

threshold will be considered for funding — within the limits of the available call budget.

CALL 2023 – what is new?

- Increased thresholds (min 8,455 EUR / max 50,745 EUR)
- Revised Calculator
- One **single WP** for one or more events (for more flexibility)

1 WP = one or more events = one or more deliverables

• Innovation / added value (avoid similarities) included in the award criteria (in relevance)

Why you should pay specific attention to gender mainstreaming in your proposal

- Attention to gender mainstreaming has an impact on the score you receive in the evaluation.
- Integrating a gender perspective in the design and implementation of your project increases the quality of your proposal

How to make sure you integrate a gender perspective?

When you draft your proposal, please consider the questions below

- Did I conduct a gender equality analysis to assess my project's design, implementation and impact?
- Did I take into account gender aspects in my needs assessment?
- Will the data and indicators I collect and create be disaggregated by sex?
- Did I include in my proposal a commitment to advance gender equality?
- Did I include in my proposal a commitment to monitor and report on the gender equality results achieved by the project in the evaluation phase?
- Do I plan to create **gender-specific indicators** to measure the project's gender equality objectives?

Adherence to **EU values** in CERV

"Outline measures to be taken and the policies in place to guarantee full compliance with the EU values mentioned in Article 2 of the Treaty on the European Union and Article 21 of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights"

Art.2 Treaty on European Union (EU values)

The Union is founded on the values of respect for human dignity, freedom, democracy, equality, the rule of law and respect for human rights, including the rights of persons belonging to minorities. These values are common to the Member States in a society in which pluralism, non-discrimination, tolerance, justice, solidarity and equality between women and men prevail.

Art.21 Charter of Fundamental Rights (Nondiscrimination)

Any discrimination based on any ground such as sex, race, colour, ethnic or social origin, genetic features, language, religion or belief, political or any other opinion, membership of a national minority, property, birth, disability, age or sexual orientation shall be prohibited.

Within the scope of application of the Treaties and without prejudice to any of their specific provisions, any discrimination on grounds of nationality shall be

Tips and tricks

- First of all : DON'T PANIC, we are here to help you ^(C)
- **Read** carefully the Call!
- Focus on eligibility criteria and mandatory documentation (e.g. eligible countries, letter of support, calculation etc.)
- Projects in scope: choose at least one specific priority
- Integrate in the proposal the gender mainstreaming and/or the child protection perspective if the activities involve minors
- Declare that your proposal is **EU Values** compliant.



Tips and tricks

- Set **realistic** objectives . Don't be overambitious
- Set concrete targets and results , which can have an impact at local and larger level
- Clear writing the application form
- Set a good collaboration among partners/ identify clearly the activities to be done in advance
- Communicate!
- Don't wait until last moment to submit
- Something not clear? contact EACEA TT team; check the <u>FAQ</u> section in the portal and contact the NCP in your country; you can get support in your own language

CHECKS AND AUDITS

- Attention: Although the Call TT is using Lump Sum type I financial scheme, the consortium (coordinator and the associated partners) must keep evidences proving that the project took place, and the events took place.
- In order to clarify the above point, the Commission published a FAQ recently : FAQ ID **35475**
- Beneficiaries must keep adequate records and other supporting documentation to prove the proper implementation of the action for at least 5 years after the balance is paid (3 years for grants up to EUR 60 000). Those records must be available, verifiable, and auditable.
- For lump projects, beneficiaries do not need to keep records of their actual costs (e.g. timesheets or invoices). There is no financial reporting, and no checks or audits of the costs incurred.
- In case of checks, reviews, audits or investigations, the beneficiaries of lump sum grants must present adequate records and other supporting documentation to prove the proper technical implementation of the action, as detailed in Annex 1 of <u>the Grant Agreement</u> (e.g. for technical documents, participation to events/seminars, publications, etc.)
- The technical documentation required for lump sum grants is the same as for all grants (i.e. there are no additional technical documents to be kept specifically for lump sum grants).

Which documents must be kept and presented in case of checks, reviews, audits or investigations of my CERV project under lump sum type I?

- Participants have to comply with financial record keeping obligations outside the grant agreement (e.g. under national law or under internal procedures).
- Art. 25 of the grant agreement
- In case of checks, reviews, audits or investigations, the beneficiaries of lump sum grants must present adequate records and other supporting documentation to prove the proper technical implementation of the action, as detailed in Annex 1
- Proof of events can be requested during financial analysis
 - Lack of evidence = grant reduction

Which documents must be kept and presented in case of checks, reviews, audits or investigations of my CERV project under lump sum type I?

A non exhaustive list of proofs:

- Presence to the event: **signed** list of attendance
- Travel: boarding passes, plane/ boat/ bus tickets
- Travel by car: any proof such as toll tickets, fuel invoices etc
- Subsistence: hotel invoices; catering invoices, any other proof directly linked to the organization of the events (e.g. music instruments reservations, translations, printing invoices, publicity etc.)
- Home hospitality: declarations from hosts that international participants were housed during the event

Communication, dissemination and visibility

- Communication and dissemination activities are part of your project proposal (impact on the score you receive in the evaluation) >practical guide: <u>https://europa.eu/!DxdBqR</u>
- Issues to consider:
 - Are the activities contributing to the promotion of gender equality and non-discrimination?
 - What are the communication channels identified? Are they accessible to the general audience, in particular to people from marginalized groups?
 - Is the action likely to produce a positive multiplier effect?
 - Is the visibility of EU funding ensured?
