



Promoting and protecting Union values

Legal and policy context for the activities:

- Strategy to strengthen the application of the Charter of Fundamental Rights in the EU
- Annual reports on the application of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights
- Work of the Charter focal points, etc.





Promoting and protecting Union values

Main activities envisaged:

- Network development and coordination with the stakeholders of the Charter strategy, e.g. public authorities, fundamental rights bodies, civil society organisations or judicial practitioners.
- Activities to increase the application of the Charter and of EU values at the EU level or in the Member States through:
 - Awareness-raising about the Charter, its scope of application and its provisions among the stakeholders
 of the Charter strategy;
 - Mutual learning, training, and exchange of good practices to build capacity to correctly apply the Charter
 - Policy analysis and advice on fundamental rights and how they should inform decision-making
- Support the **capacity-building of CSOs and HRDs** working to protect fundamental rights and EU values in the context of the shrinking civic space.

Leading the call for LGBTIQ equality around the world

- Launched in 2020 and reaching its final year.
- Framework partners are essential for the successful implementation of the Strategy advocacy, cooperation with civil society, promoting LGBTIQ equality at local level, etc.
- Report on the implementation of the LGBTIQ Equality Strategy 2020-2025 was published in September 2024.



Future actions



Political Guidelines for next Commission & mission letter for the Commissioner H. Lahbib

• Renewed LGBTIQ Equality Strategy for post-2025 that should notably focus on the continued and persisting hate-motivated harassment and violence, including online, and banning the conversion practices.

Consultation process will start in early 2025



Diversity and inclusion at the workplace

- In its Communication 'Non-discrimination and equal opportunities: a renewed commitment' adopted on 2 July 2008, the Commission recognised that legislation is more effective when it goes hand in hand with progressive and innovative strategies implemented by employers to manage an increasingly diverse workforce.
- Diversity policies can help organisations to successfully attract the best talents and ensure they can fully use their abilities to maximise their contribution to the company.
- Therefore, the Commission has been working closely with employers for a long time, both private and public, to foster diversity in the workplace more broadly. Since 2010, the Commission has been funding an EU-level platform of Diversity Charters, which now consists of 27 Diversity Charters.





Future actions



Diversity and inclusion in the workplace

- The Commission has tendered a study:
 - to investigate the benefits and potential business case for private and public organisations to pursue diversity and inclusion policies
 - to investigate the impact of signing a Diversity Charter in developing diversity and inclusion policies in an organisation



Age

 The European Union has since 2000 a directive banning – among others – discrimination on the basis of age in employment and occupation

Future actions

• Study on discrimination on the grounds of age in the EU (to be finalized in Q3 2025) that will help shape the scope of the future Commission engagement in age equality.

What we are looking for

EU-wide umbrella organisations active in our policy fields having members in at least 14 EU Member States (FGM organisations: 12 EU MS)

Activities (not exhaustive list)

- > policy analysis and advice, especially in new fields such as online violence and use of IA
- advocacy, e.g. in fields such as women's sexual and reproductive health and rights
- > research and data collection/sharing/analysis, e.g. in women's engagement in leadership
- > network development and capacity building (also through regranting)
- > mutual learning, training, and exchange of good practices, e.g. for victims' services accessibility
- > awareness raising, e.g. on the role of consent in sexual relationships, equal share of care work
- information and dissemination activities with EU added value, e.g. promotion of equal pay for equal work or work of equal value

Promoting Gender Equality & Preventing and combating gender-based violence – actions under the <u>Gender</u> Equality Strategy

Three pillars:

- Free (from violence and stereotypes)
- Thrive (in a gender-equal economy)
- Lead (equally throughout society)





Promoting Gender equality

- Pay Transparency Directive (May 2023)
 - Transposition by June 2026 Commission organises implementation workshops with MS to assist them, facilitate exchange of experience and answer questions
 - CERV programme supports 8 projects from national authorities to help them to develop guidance, tools and awareness raising for gender-sensitive job evaluation and classification systems





Promoting Gender equality

Work-Life Balance Directive (2019)

- Transposition by August 2022 following infringement procedures launched, one MS still referred to the Court of Justice (ES). IE and BE notified after the referral that they completed the transposition
- CERV programme supports 17 projects focusing on tackling the gender care gap by encouraging the use of rights created under the Directive by both women and men (e.g. family leaves, flexible work) and raising awareness on the value of care work





Promoting Gender Equality

- Directive on improving gender balance in corporate boards (2022)
 - Transposition by 28 December 2024
 - Commission provided to MS an explanatory document for the transposition of the directive





Preventing and combating gender-based violence

- EU's accession to the CoE <u>Istanbul Convention</u> (October 2023)
 - Adjustments to the voting rules of the Committee of the Parties (CoP)
 - GREVIO's evaluation of the EU's implementation of IC (questionnaire)
- <u>Directive on combating violence against women and domestic violence</u> (May 2024)
 - Measures preventing violence from happening
 - Access to justice, adequate protection and support for victims
 - Criminalization of FGM and forced marriage
 - Criminalization of the most widespread forms of cyberviolence
 - June 2027 transposition deadline
 - Support from CERV programme through the upcoming 2025 Daphne call





Preventing and combating gender-based violence

- Network for the prevention of gender-based violence (2023)
 - Composed of MS representatives (stakeholders invited on ad-hoc basis)
 - Third meeting 27-28 November Non-consensual Sharing of Intimate Images and cyber hate speech based on gender: issues of prevention after the entry into force of the VAW Directive
 - Next meeting planned for end of March/beginning of April 2025

Recommendation on harmful practices

- Will complement the Directive and help MS to prevent and tackle harmful practices more effectively (e.g. female genital mutilation and forced marriage)
- To be adopted soon

Code of conduct

 Commission will facilitate the development of a framework for cooperation between internet platforms - to further counter cyber violence, to protect women's safety online

- Political commitment for the future
- Political Guidelines for next Commission & mission letter for the Commissionerdesignate H. Lahbib
- Roadmap for Women's Rights March 2025 setting out the key gender equality policy principles for the years ahead
- New Gender Equality Strategy for post 2025 on all issues affecting women, across the EU: GBV, economic empowerment, participation in politics, discrimination in health, education, housing, social protection, supply of goods/services, and considering challenges in labour market, online violence and work-life balance

Combating violence against children and ensuring child protection

<u>Commission Recommendation on integrated child protection</u> <u>systems in the best interest of the child</u> (adopted April 2024)

- ➤ Improve coordination and cooperation, across sectors and authorities, starting locally
- Continuum of comprehensive and coordinated multi-disciplinary support: prevention, early identification, cross-sectorial support (e.g. health, education, psycho-social, child-friendly justice, care)
- > Improved use of resources, data collection and monitoring
- Zero tolerance regarding violence against children, society-wide approach
- Strong focus on anti-bullying action plan against cyberbullying announced in Commissioner Micallef's mission letter



Combating violence against children and ensuring child protection

- Victims' Rights Directive and proposal for revision
- ❖ <u>Directive</u> on <u>combating gender-based violence</u> against women and domestic violence (May 2024)
- ❖EU accession to <u>Istanbul Convention</u> on preventing and combating violence against women and domestic violence (October 2023)
- Children in migration (Pact on Migration and Asylum and Common Implementation Plan); Ukrainian child protection central in the implementation of the temporary protection directive)
- Directive on Trafficking in human beings (May 2024)
- ❖ Proposal to recast the 2011 Child Sexual Abuse Directive (February 2024) & Proposal for a Regulation on Child Sexual Abuse

What we look for:

- EU Networks umbrella organisations with strong experience in children's rights
- Focus on children (as per UNCRC definition below 18)
- Support to member organisations, capacity building, access to funding, regranting
- Support towards child participation central, safe and meaningful involvement and support towards child safeguarding (child protection policy)
- Advocacy, awareness-raising, exchange & sharing, training
- Research, data collection, analysis

The EU anti-racism action plan 2020-2025

- The EU anti-racism action plan was launched in 2020 and reaching its final year.
- Framework partners are essential for the successful implementation of the EU anti-racism action plan especially for strong active cooperation with civil society and in strengthening the anti-racism work at local level.
- The implementation report of the action plan looking at the state of play of the action plan's implementation was published in September 2024.
- The work will continue: The anti-racism strategy beyond 2025.

Roma equality, inclusion and participation

- In the <u>EU Roma Strategic Framework for equality, inclusion and</u> <u>participation</u>, the Commission has committed to support capacity-building of Roma civil society.
- Networks of Roma and pro-Roma civil society organisations are encouraged to apply for this call.
- Activities could include:
 - O Supporting the implementation of the EU Roma strategic framework and of the national Roma strategic frameworks;
 - Fighting antigypsyism and discrimination against Roma;
 - O Promoting awareness about Roma culture and history, including the memory of the Roma Holocaust.

Combating hate speech and hate crime

Legal and policy context for the activities:

- 2008 Framework Decision on combating certain forms of expressions of racism and xenophobia requires the criminalisation of public incitement to violence or hatred based on race, colour, religion, descent or national or ethnic origin.
- 2023 Joint Communication on "No Place for Hate: a Europe united against hatred"
- The <u>High Level Group on combating hate speech and hate crime</u> and in particular its work to enhance response on the ground on reporting and data collection, victims support and training.
- The <u>Code of conduct on countering illegal hate speech online</u> agreed with major social media platforms

Combating hate speech and hate crime

Main activities envisaged:

- Network development/coordination (joint networks of both public authorities and civil society organisations) to foster coordinated action and exchange of good practices
- Training involving CSOs and public authorities, e.g. to better recognise bias motivations
- ONLINE: monitoring of social media platforms, engagement with trust and safety teams of platforms under Code of conduct

Promoting citizens' engagement

Thematic priorities

- promoting democratic standards, including free, fair, resilient and inclusive electoral processes, promoting election integrity, fighting disinformation, information manipulation and foreign interference
- promoting EU citizenship rights*
- · promoting citizens' engagement, and democratic participation

This area also includes 'Freedom of movement and of residence', as grandfathered in the Agreement on the withdrawal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland from the European Union and the European Atomic Energy Community

Legal and policy context for the activities

- European Democracy Action Plan (2020)
 - Reinforcing democracy and integrity of elections package (2021)
 - Commission Recommendation on protecting journalists and human rights defenders who engage in public participation from manifestly unfounded or abusive court proceedings ('Strategic lawsuits against public participation'). (2022)
- Defence of Democracy Package 2023
 - Commission Recommendation (EU) 2023/2829 of 12 December 2023 on inclusive and resilient electoral processes in the Union and enhancing the European nature and efficient conduct of the elections to the European Parliament
 - Commission Recommendation on promoting the engagement and effective participation of citizens and civil society organisations in public policy-making processes C/2023/8627 final
- EU Citizenship Report (2020)
- EU Citizenship Package (2023)

What are we looking for?

European Networks - Civil society organisations active at EU level - European think tanks

Main activities:

- mutual learning, training, and exchange of good practices;
- awareness raising;
- critical thinking and media literacy activities (including pre-bunking);
- citizens' engagement activities inspired by methods of participatory and representative democracy;
- interaction between citizens (including young people), academia and decision-makers at national and EU level


EU Strategy on combating antisemitism and fostering Jewish life

The **EU Strategy** sets out measures focusing on:

- (1) preventing and combating all forms of antisemitism;
- (2) protecting and fostering Jewish life in the EU; and
- (3) education, research and Holocaust remembrance.
 - Flagships initiatives
 - EU Network of sites where the Holocaust happened
 - Network of Young European Ambassadors to promote Holocaust remembrance

These measures are complemented by the EU's international efforts to address antisemitism globally.

First Progress Report of the EU Antisemitism Strategy, published on 14 October 2024.

CERV-2025-OG-FPA

- Framework Partnership (36 months)
- FPA is a pre-requisite for being eligible for CERV operating grants
- Action Plan: 3-year perspective, objectives, activities, estimated budget, KPIs

CERV-2025-OG SGA

- Specific agreement for operating grant (12 months)
- Covers one financial year
- Detailed annual work programme and budget breakdown
- Budget envelope per priority

Eligibility criteria for applicants

Applicants must:

- be legal entities (private bodies)
- be non-profit organisations
- be established in one of the Member State of the EU (including overseas countries and territories (OCTs))
- be a European network, or a civil society organisation active at EU level, or a European think tank
- be a single applicant; in case of European networks: only the network may submit an application; the member organisations are not eligible to apply.



Further eligibility criteria for applicants

	Eligibility criteria					
Priorities 1 – 7	Only European networks can apply! Applicants must be an established formal network (with own legal personality) organised at European level with member organisations from at least 14 EU Member States.					
Priority 4 "Preventing and combating gender-based violence"	If the applicant is active in the area of female genital mutilation (FGM), it must be an established formal network (with own legal personality) organised at European level with member organisations in at least 12 EU Member States.					
Priority 8 "Promoting citizens engagement"	If the applicant is a civil society organisation active at EU level, then the applicant needs to have partner organisations in at least 14 EU Member States.					

Eligible activities

Indicative examples:

- awareness raising & advocacy
- capacity building and network activities
- citizens' engagement activities inspired by methods of participatory and representative democracy
- research and data collection/ sharing/ analysis
- information and dissemination activities with EU added value

Eligible activities

The activities must:

- be linked to the chosen policy priority
- take place in eligible countries
- happen during the eligibility period of the SGA
- comply with highest ethical standards and EU values
- be covered by a child protection policy if targeting minors (< 18 years of age)



Option: Financial Support to Third Parties (FSTP)

- Targets members of European networks
- Objective: increase CERV outreach
- FSTP must be implemented via call for proposals
- Maximum amount per third party per financial year: EUR 60 000
- FSTP budget should not exceed 25% of the CERV annual operating grant
- Dedicated work package in the <u>SGA</u> proposal!

Framework partners that qualify as European networks have the possibility to regrant to their member organisations








Budget CERV-2025-OG-SGA call

- Budget categories and cost eligibility rules see <u>Call document</u>
- Budget-based mixed:
 - Actual costs: for personnel costs, subcontracting costs, equipment costs, other goods and services, financial support to third parties
 - Unit costs: for <u>travel</u>, <u>accommodation and subsistence</u> costs & <u>volunteer costs</u>, following their Commission decisions.
- Indirect costs: For operating grants, there is no indirect costs
- Receiving an operating grant may however make you ineligible for receiving indirect costs in your EU action grants, unless you are able to demonstrate cost separation (i.e. that your operating grant does not cover any costs which are covered by your action grants.

Key figures CERV-2025-OG-SGA call

Project duration: 12 months



For FPA: 36 months!

- Project budget: no min & no max limit
- Co-financing: the <u>maximum</u> funding rate is 80%
- Non-cumulative award: A beneficiary may be awarded only one operating grant from the EU budget per financial year








