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Erasmus+ external evaluation - preliminary findings (1/2)

Effectiveness

- Strong performance against the outputs, results, and impacts in intervention logic
- Consistent programme architecture
- Effective implementation of four horizontal priorities
- Progress to enhance the programme's **inclusivity** over the two programming periods.

Efficiency

- High cost-effectiveness of KA1
- Need for additional funding to fully reach programme's objectives & engage Few Opp participants
- Improved monitoring arrangements
- Simplification measures are well appreciated, but need to further simplify some procedures and improve IT landscape for indirect management actions





Erasmus+ external evaluation - preliminary findings (2/2)

Coherence

- Internal coherence: good alignment of objectives and programme structure, clear architecture and appropriate organisation into key action
- High external coherence at the EU level, but some overlaps with European Solidarity Corps
- Further reinforce synergies through e.g. sharing good practices

Relevance

- Socio-economic needs & challenges well reflected in objectives, priorities, actions
- Good alignment with both European and national priorities
- High relevance for needs of individuals & organisations
- Further efforts needed to facilitate accessibility for small and newcomer organisations and FO people

EU added value

- Unique and consistent framework for mobility, cooperation, & policy development
- Significant added value for individuals and organisations
- Essential role in promoting shared EU values
- International added value

Erasmus+ post 2027



Erasmus+ 2021-2027 at midpoint

- The groundwork for the subsequent programming period has started.
- Two key phases to shape the lead-up to the launch of the new programme:
 - first phase, 2024-2025: focus on the preparation of the legislative package;
 - second phase, until end of 2027: interinstitutional negotiations and preparations for implementation.
- Upcoming consultation activities a specific stakeholders' event on 18
 February 2025, public consultation and other activities to come



Towards the post 2027 programme



Political guidelines

- Political momentum to align the future direction of Erasmus+ with the broader goals of the Commission and further enhance its impact in the years beyond 2027
- President von der Leyen has expressed a strong commitment to strengthening the Erasmus+ programme
- Recognise the significant contribution to the acquisition of skills and social cohesion.
- The role of Erasmus+ to address the challenges EU is facing is also underlined both in the Letta and the Draghi reports.



Boost skills development

- Focus on better equipping all individuals to meet the demand of the evolving workplace;
- Address skills mismatch, shortage of skills and basic skills deficit;
- Contribute to a robust EU innovation ecosystem and strengthening competitiveness on the global scene;
- Enable all individuals to develop the skills necessary to thrive in a transforming world;
- Contribute to strengthen societal resilience and healthy democracies.



Support EU values, democracy and participation

- Internal and external pressures to social cohesion, democratic values and citizen participation.
- Tensions in the geopolitical scene, demographic changes, economic challenges, socio-economic inequalities.
- Evolving European political landscape, political polarisation, abstention rates, disinformation and fake news.
- Reinforcing support to EU values, strengthening European identity, active citizenship is crucial



What more for post 2027?

- The programme should further ensure that everyone has equal access to mobility opportunities.
- The next generation should offer an even more user-friendly and streamlined programme.
- In the field of sport, opportunities for cooperation could be optimised to better concentrate on key priorities and support to grassroots sport organisations.
- Unlock the potential of the field for fostering transversal skills development and mental and physical well-being for all.

Strengths of Erasmus+ Sport 2021-2027

- Generate a positive impact and facilitate change in the European sports landscape
- Promote and facilitate cross-border cooperation in sports
- Raise awareness on health, equal opportunities, and civic engagement
- Improve innovation in the field of sport
- Increase participation in physical activity
- Provide individual mobility to sport stakeholders





Areas of improvement for the future

Accessibility and simplification

- Simplify the application process
- Encourage more participation from smaller organisations

Networking

 More opportunities to strengthen cross-project collaboration

Sustainability

 More focus on project continuity and environmental aspects

Funding and framework

- OK lump-sum
- Further funding flexibility

Monitoring, technology and evaluation

- Standardised impact measurement indicators
- More focused on crosssharing of project data



1. Accessibility and simplification



- Provide more guidance and support to smaller
 organisations to make the more program accessible
- A simpler and more user-friendly online portal would allow more time for executing projects
- Streamlining access to information and resources would encourage more newcomers
- Simplification would decrease frustrations and more partners would remain
- Adjust the application and reporting procedures

 based on the size of grant



2. Funding and framework



- The sum of the budget is a limitation for largescale projects
- The scope of the 36 months is too short
- Introducing more flexible funding options will support the innovation of new partnership structures and encourage involvement of more organisations




3. Networking



- Introduce a permanent EU networking forum
- Improved dissemination of projects to avoid duplicates and improve collaboration
- Facilitation of meetings with previous, present, and future project coordinators
- Increased visibility of participants profiles and information about their projects



4. Monitoring, technology, and evaluation



- There is a need for more results orientation.
- Introduce impact goals and measurement indicators to improve consistency and comparability across projects.
- Increase focus on data collection and cross-sharing for future projects. Implement an improved data management system.
- Provide further guidance and support for evaluators of project proposals to ensure consistency.



5. Sustainability



- Further focus on sustainability will increase the longterm impact of the project
- Projects should provide plans for continuation or dissemination for replication to ensure long term impact
- Sustainability considerations should be a specific
 evaluation criteria for new project proposals
- Introduction of **qualitative measurements** of sustainability for projects
- Provide support on how to integrate sustainability
 measures in project execution
