1 - Erasmus Mundus New Ambition

3 main priorities compared to the past

- More **strategic** and more **attractive** for institutions and students
- More **open** and more **inclusive** for institutions and students
- More **sustainable** projects beyond EU funding

2 - Commission's strategy

- Stronger focus on the **institutional** aspects (from KA1 to KA2)
- A **new** component (lot): EMDM
- A funding scheme...
 - targeted on studies rather than mobility
 - more **generous** (increased funding for institutions and individual)
 - more **simple** and **flexible** (less and clearer rules and prescriptions, principles rather than rules, simple financial model based on unit costs,)

3 - Consequences in operational terms

- Positive feed-back received about the new approach/ concepts
- A new challenge for both EACEA and the partner institutions



Turn the principles/priorities into new practice

➤ Consequences for EACEA

Change in EACEA way of monitoring projects

- Less rules to check and less reporting requirements: “*more support than control*”
- More focus on the institutional aspects (e.g. cooperation arrangements, degrees, enrolled students)
- Priority on exchange of experience and practice (a new initiative in preparation for implementation as of 2023)

➤ Consequences for the institutions

More autonomy and responsibilities from an operational point of view

➤ Need for internal clarification and formalisation of *modus operandi*

➤ Need for transparent and comprehensive information to external stakeholders

➔ Main tools: *Consortium agreement, Student agreement, Website*
